## **REMEMBRANCE DAY IN CANADA**

Every year on November 11th, Canadians observe Remembrance Day to honor the men and women who have served and continue to serve in the Canadian Armed Forces. This special day marks the end of World War I in 1918, when fighting stopped on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Across the country, people pause for a moment of silence at 11 a.m. to remember those who lost their lives in war and peacekeeping missions.

The poppy flower is a powerful symbol of remembrance. It became associated with war memorials after the famous poem "In Flanders Fields," written by Canadian soldier Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. The poem describes how bright red poppies grew among the graves of soldiers who died in battle. Today, Canadians wear paper poppies on their clothing as a sign of respect and gratitude for the sacrifices made by others.

Ceremonies are held at war memorials, schools, and community centers across the country. Veterans, students, and families gather to listen to speeches, lay wreaths, and sing the national anthem. Many young people also learn about the importance of peace and the value of remembering history, so that the tragedies of war are never repeated.
